



The Organization of Scientific Area Committees (OSAC) for Forensic Science is seeking assistance to support its efforts and ensure proper recognition of forensic science service providers (FSSPs) that have implemented standards on the <u>OSAC Registry</u>.



To date, over 125 FSSPs have self-declared their implementation of standards listed on the OSAC Registry (media releases for some of these providers can be found <u>here</u>). Additionally, OSAC has received public support for standards and implementation from seven major forensic science professional organizations (a list of these organizations and their statements can be found <u>here</u>).

If your organization has implemented standards on the OSAC Registry, either entire standards or parts of them, you are eligible to receive recognition as an OSAC Registry Implementer. This recognition includes the issuance of an OSAC Implementer Certificate.

- Serve as a mentor and encourage broader implementation by assisting other Forensic Science Service Providers with awareness efforts

- Provide real time and retrospective evaluation of standard performance and data for the standards development and refinement process
- Advance forensic science to greater levels of quality and efficiency
- Receive recognition for laboratory quality system improvement efforts
