Recount Timeline



Jill Stein campaign for President of the United States requests statewide recount stating there is evidence of voting irregularities that indicate potential tampering with electronic voting systems.

WEC determined the recount petition fee to be sufficient and received confirmation that the estimated recount fee of nearly \$3.5 million was deposited by the Stein campaign.

WEC staff conducted a webinar teleconference with county and municipal clerks, candidates, candidate representatives, interested members of the public and the press to ensure policies and procedures would be implemented uniformly across all 72 counties conducting the recount.



Recount Timeline



Recount to be conducted by the county board of canvassers were required to begin and needed to be completed by December 12 - one day before the federal safe harbor date.



WEC staff developed templates for counties to use to provide daily progress reports of what reporting units (precincts) were recounted that day and requested an explanation of a change in the original results which equaled more than 10 votes in a reporting unit.

Posted certified recount results and board of canvassers minutes by county to the Commission website on a rolling basis to provide the public with a real time update as to which counties were done and which counties were still in progress.

WEC Canvass Reporting System County by County Report 2016 General Election

Developed and issued press releases, clerk communications, recount updates and social media posts to provide the candidates, clerks, the public and the press with a transparent snapshot of the recount.

More Transparency



The internal recount team met twice daily to brief on issues that arose, devising strategy to address those issues, and communicate this news to the county board of canvassers, candidates and the public.

Worked extra hours & extra days to provide county boards of canvass a resource if an issue arose.

They were provided after-hours phone numbers which were monitored by staff members throughout the recount period.



Jill Stein v. Wisconsin Elections Commission, et al. (Case. No. 16CV3060)

On November 28, 2016, Jill Stein filed a lawsuit in Dane County Circuit Court, requesting a hand recount of all ballots cast. Under Wis. Stat. § 5.90(1).

Following a hearing on November 29, 2016, the Court denied Jill Stein's request, which allowed each county board of canvass to choose their method of tabulation for the recount. Jill Stein did not appeal the Court's decision.



Jill Stein v. Wisconsin Elections Commission, et al. (Case. No. 16CV3060)



Great America PAC, et al., v. Wisconsin Elections Commission, et al. (Case No. 16CV0795)

On Dec. 1, 2016, Great America PAC, Stop Hillary PAC and Ronald R. Johnson lawsuit alleged the recount would be conducted in a manner that violates the requirements set forth in Bush v. Gore, 531 U.S. 98 (2000) for recounts in presidential elections.

Additionally, they alleged that the recount could extend beyond the federal "safe harbor" deadline of Dec. 13, 2016. Plaintiff's sought an emergency temporary restraining order to halt the recount.



Great America PAC, et al., v. Wisconsin Elections Commission, et al. (Case No. 16CV0795)

On Dec. 2, 2016, the motion for an emergency temporary restraining order was denied.


On Dec. 9, 2016, the preliminary injunction motion was also denied. Great America PAC voluntarily dismissed their lawsuit on Dec. 19, 2016



Ultimately, the certified results following the recount changed very little from the original results – with Donald Trump gaining 844 votes, Hillary Clinton gaining 713 votes for a net gain of 131 votes for Donald Trump. Jill Stein gained 66 votes.







The recount reve presidential elecextended his lead and total votes in cast. Recount pro possibly tamper found no enden

However, the small net change in votes obscured that there were thousands of both positive and negative swings in the final totals.

At least 9,039 presidential votes weren't counted correctly on Election Night, and only were added to the official results because of the recount, the State Journal review found. Another 2,161 votes were originally counted but later tossed out for reasons including to square vote totals with the number of voters who signed the poll book.

(4) If a valid petition for a recount is filed under s. 9.01 in an election at which an electronic voting system was used to record and tally the votes cast, each party to the recount may designate one or more persons who are authorized to receive access to the software components that were used to record and tally the votes in the election. The commission shall grant access to the software components to each designated person if, before receiving access, the person enters into a written agreement with the commission that obligates the person to exercise the highest degree of reasonable care to maintain the confidentially of all proprietary information to which the person is provided access, unless otherwise permitted in a contract entered into under sub. (5).
