The GENC Ed1.0 provided the U.S. Government with a profile of the ISO 3166-1, the country level names/codes. The GENC Ed2.0 will be published in early 2014 and will extend the U.S. Government profile to include the ISO 3166-2 subdivision names/codes. The specific URL for obtaining the GNIS Feature ID cross-referenced to the old FIPS 55 code is our download site where the specific URL is http://geonames.usgs.gov/domestic/download_data.htm. At this site, one should use State Files With Federal Codes where the GNIS Feature ID is provided cross referenced to old FIPS 55 codes along with other internal and unofficial codes from other agencies. As you are aware, on January 1, 2006 the FIPS 55 Code was replaced by the GNIS Feature ID as the official Federal reference to named entities (all named entities except roads & highways). Also, in late 2009, the GNIS Feature ID along with the feature name and location became an ANSI Standard, and which is related at the website. The old FIPS 55 code is now an unofficial internal code at the Bureau of the Census, but reflected at this website, the official website for the official reference to named entities (except roads & highways).

The specific URL for searching GNIS (the Geographic Names Information System - GNIS, the nation's official geographic names repository) is <http://geonames.usgs.gov/pls/gnispublic> where retrievals can be accomplished based upon various criteria. Once information is retrieved in columnar form, one must click on each name individually to view the full entry where are located the Federal Codes (retrievals only). There is also an advanced function where one can search using an after date function, etc.
