Applications

Applications must have approval by NMI or DI Management. Applicants must specify what type of activity is being sought, the level of support required, and the project plan. Applicants requesting Guest Researcher appointments must meet language proficiency requirements.

Evaluation Criteria

Efforts will be taken to ensure support is provided to as many NMIs as possible. New activities/partnerships will be given priority. Applications must clearly identify project objectives. Applicants should contact NIST hosts/ collaborators prior to submitting an application.

Guidance on Language Proficiency Verification

Effective January 5, 2015, the U.S. Department of State is requiring all prospective exchange visitors coming to the U.S. in J-1 visa status demonstrate sufficient English proficiency. The burden for documenting English proficiency rests with the host institution. Therefore, before the International and Academic Affairs Office (IAAO) may issue the DS-2019 (***Certificate of Eligibility for Exchange Visitor J-1 Status***), documentation must be provided by the NIST host of the potential FGR's English language proficiency. It is **recommended** that the English proficiency verification be completed **prior to extending the invitation to participate in NIST's Exchange Program**.

The Department of State released the following guidance to illustrate the level of proficiency that will be required:

"The Department believes that not only is an exchange visitor's success in his or her particular program dependent upon sufficient English language capability, but good English communication skills are essential to ensure the health, safety, and welfare of exchange visitors. Moreover, the Department continues to find that too many exchange visitors lack sufficient English proficiency to perform their jobs or complete their exchange programs; to navigate daily life in the United States; to read and comprehend program materials; to understand fully their responsibilities, rights, and protections; and to know how to obtain assistance, if necessary. Accordingly the Department adopts a modified version of the regulatory language governing the Trainee and Intern categories as the program-wide standard for determining the English language proficiency of exchange visitors. The Department reminds sponsors to retain evidence of how they measured applicants' English language proficiency so that it may be made available to the Department upon request."

Any of the following methods established by the Department of State for determining English language proficiency will suffice:

- 1. English Language Proficiency Test:** IAAO will accept results of either the IELTS (International English Language Testing System) or TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language) as they are the most widely utilized tests in higher education and are available throughout the world:
 - IELTS overall score of 5.5 or higher
 - TOEFL (internet based) overall score of 65 or higher, or computer based score of 183 or higher, or paper based score of 513 or higher.
- 2. Signed Documentation from an Academic Institution or English Language School:** IAAO will accept a transcript with enrollment and grades from a post-secondary academic institution where English is the primary language of instruction.
- 3. Documented Interview Conducted by the NIST Sponsor in-person, by videoconference, or by web camera (NOTE: a telephone interview is acceptable only if the scholar is personally known to the Sponsor):** IAAO will accept documentation of a video interview conducted by the NIST sponsor, unless the scholar is personally known to the host, in which case a telephone interview will suffice.

For all incoming J1 Exchange Scholars, the NIST sponsor must complete and sign the English Proficiency Verification Form and forward it to IAAO either as an attachment to the NAIS Process, as an email attachment or in hard copy (Building 101/Room A207, Mailstop 1090). The interviewer need not be an expert in English language testing.

Note: NIST is required to retain the English Proficiency Verification Forms confirming the method used to determine English proficiency, and including any applicable proof. Verification documents must be received before a DS-2019 may be issued. **Failure to do so may result in NIST losing Department of State certification to host J-1 exchange visitors.**
